I will prioritise my learning so that I am able to contribute to these initiatives or further initiatives as identified together with our First Nations community.

### 2026-2030 Business Plan

We will be launching our NEW 5-year Business Plan on Monday 13 October. We have students, family and community representatives participating in the launch to all staff. The same week we will be sharing to all families and the wider community the Future Story Video and our 2026-2030 Business Plan.

I have appreciated the time and commitment of our student leaders, staff and family and community representatives throughout this eighteen-month process of development. It is rewarding to see the ideas created without barriers or parameters from the Crazy 8s Activity by staff, student leaders and the School Board transform into a plan for our school's future.

### **Teaching and Learning**

#### **Review of Student Behaviour Plan**

Our school Student Behaviour Plan aligns with the Department of Education's Student Behaviour in Public Schools policy, procedures and requirements, which became effective in July 2023. As part of our regular school review, we consider current practices, what's working well for student behaviour in our school and identify how we strengthen practices.

The purpose of our school plan is to support an orderly, inclusive, supportive and culturally responsive environment that enables students to fulfil their learning potential. This a responsibility shared by all members of the Geraldton Senior High School (GSHS) community. Positive student behaviour is essential to promote engagement in learning and to maximise the impact of classroom teaching. We strive to build a culture of positive behaviour that values students' strengths, abilities and diversity.

Consultation with our school community is an important part of our review process. Staff contribution has been provided through Learning areas consultation and review via the Positive Behaviour Support (PBS), Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) and Work Health & Safety (WHS) committees. Student voice will be provided by the Student Leadership Group and Maajajimahna Mob and parent and community voice provided by the Cultural Reference Group and School Board.

Once the review is completed, the revised Student Behaviour Plan will be available via the school website, or on request from the school reception.

### **Community Partnerships**

We have gratitude for our community partnerships and the opportunities they provide to our students and staff. Examples of our current partnerships which positively impact outcomes for students include:

City of Greater Geraldton and Westcycle – eRideables workshop to build understanding of legislation and provide practical experience using eRideables.

Yamatji Marlpa Aborignal Corporation and Bundiyarra Aboriginal Community Aboriginal Corporation— providing a voice of the youth to support the Yamatji on Country meeting achieve its vison of enabling a platform where community can come together to voice concerns, identify common goals, and propose solutions that are rooted in Country, Culture, and Community.

Headspace Consortium – working with agencies to identify strategies which support young people accessing resources which enable positive health and wellbeing.

Our Midwest and Headspace presence at the school *Wear It Purple Day* celebration to support and empower LGBTQIA+ youth by creating safe, supportive, and inclusive environments.

### **DEPUTY PRINCIPAL YEAR 11 AND 12**

### Strengthening Learning Opportunities for Year 11 and 12 Students in 2026

At Geraldton SHS, our priority is ensuring every student has the best chance of success in their senior years. From 2026, changes to the Year 11 and 12 timetable will strengthen academic achievement, provide targeted support, and prepare students for future pathways.

### Year 11

From 2026, all Year 11 students will have a full timetable and will no longer finish early on Thursdays. Their Thursday Block 3 (Block 25) session will be structured according to individual needs, such as:

- ATAR Preparation exam practice and course support
- **OLNA Support** Reading, Writing, Numeracy assistance
- Follow the Dream academic support for Aboriginal students
- **Homeroom** mentoring, study organisation, and goal setting

Students attending TAFE on Thursdays will continue as normal. This ensures every Year 11 has structured support to succeed in their courses and build strong foundations for Year 12.

### Year 12

Year 12 students will also continue with Block 25, timetabled Thursdays at Block 5. Options will include:

- ATAR preparation
- OLNA support
- Follow the Dream
- Homeroom for study support and mentoring

Students who are on track for WACE may be eligible for early dismissal at lunch. TAFE attendance will remain unaffected.

### Why These Changes?

These adjustments reflect our commitment to ensuring senior students:

- Receive tailored support to succeed in ATAR pathways
- · Meet OLNA standards and WACE graduation requirements
- Benefit from additional guidance, mentoring, and cultural support
- Have structured time dedicated to academic growth and personal development

We are confident these changes will help every student achieve their best and graduate with strong skills and pathways for future study, training, or work.



### **Celebrating Achievement at GSHS**

Geraldton SHS is building a culture of academic excellence by recognising and inspiring student achievement. One new initiative is the **High Achievers Lunch**, introduced this term to celebrate students who demonstrated:

- Six or more A or B grades
- No failing grades
- For Year 11 and 12, recent academic awards or an ATAR score of 80+

Earlier this Term, in the lead-up to NAIDOC, Geraldton SHS welcomed Mr Sean Choolburra, who performed his *Live and Deadly Show* for our Year 11 and 12 students. Sean is a proud First Nations comedian, dancer, storyteller, and cultural ambassador, he is recognised as one of Australia's most prominent Indigenous entertainers. His performances weave together traditional Aboriginal culture with contemporary comedy and storytelling, creating an experience that is both educational and entertaining. Many students were excited to also learn that Sean is the voice of Maynard in the much-loved cartoon *Bluey*. As a gesture of appreciation, Sean was presented with a unique artwork, personally created by students in the Warlugurra Walgamanyulu program, carrying special local significance.









The **Aboriginal Education Team** proudly hosted their **NAIDOC Week Celebrations** this term. Guided by this year's theme, "The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy", the team organised a variety of events throughout the week, ensuring all students and staff were included in the celebrations.

To open the week of NAIDOC celebrations, a whole-school assembly was held at Geraldton SHS. The presenters led with pride and confidence as they welcomed invited guests, staff, and students. The assembly was hosted by Year 12 School Captains, Zade and Charlize. The Acknowledgement of Country was delivered by Malcolm, followed by Honey, who shared a moving poem that reflected this year's NAIDOC theme. This year, we were fortunate to welcome two remarkable guest speakers who generously shared yarns about their life journeys, and the pride and importance of their culture and identity. Former student and proud descendant of the Amangu, Nhanagardi and Wajarri Peoples, Miss Kyiesha Ronan, and Ms Marion Baumgarten, a proud Yamatji Nyarlu with ancestral connections to the Ngoonooru Wadjari, Badimia and Tjupan Peoples, spoke with great wisdom and heart. We are sincerely thankful to both influential women for their time and the wonderful stories they shared with us. Their yarns were deeply appreciated and warmly received by both staff and students. To close the assembly, the newly named Wirri Bundara Dance Group took to the stage, performing a modernised routine infused with traditional movements to Normey Jay's song "Stolen Generation." The group, made up of proud First Nations boys and girls, captivated the audience with their performance, blending smooth contemporary beats from the east coast artist with the powerful sounds of traditional instruments. Following the assembly, guests were invited to share in a morning tea, providing a wonderful opportunity to yarn with the presenters, performers, and staff.

















### **ABORIGINAL EDUCATION**

The Aboriginal Education Team provided a traditional lunch to share with invited guests, staff and students for the annual NAIDOC cook up on Wednesday. The menu featured a variety of exquisite dishes made with kangaroo meat, including curries, stews, mince, kebabs, sausages, and a sweet and sour dish, all served alongside damper and steamed rice. This certainly was a hit with most students allowing their palates to enjoy a cultural experience. It was wonderful to see students and staff enjoying the meal together, embracing the true spirit and meaning of NAIDOC.









The following day, Thursday, the Stars Foundation mentors hosted an engaging expo on the oval, with a variety of stalls offering exciting prizes, fun activities, and helpful advice for students throughout recess and lunch. The strong sense of community was evident, with organisations such as GRAMS, Bunnings, Real Futures Parent Pathways, Geraldton Universities Centre, Geraldton Police, Meedac, PCYC and the Geraldton Museum generously giving their time to be part of Geraldton SHS's week of celebration.





To wrap up the week of celebrations, a friendly football match was held at lunchtime on Thursday, hosted by the Clontarf Academy staff. From the first whistle, the game was fast-paced and entertaining, with students eager to showcase their deadly football skills and staff just as keen to reveal some hidden talents of their own. The highlight of the match was the **Player of the Match Award**, featuring a one-of-a-kind football specially designed by artist Mr Arthur Garlett. Another highlight of the week was the **Sand Art Project**, where students worked alongside talented Noongar/Yamatji artist Mr Arthur Garlett to create a stunning masterpiece using locally donated sand. Together, they brought to life a powerful sand art masterpiece. Arthur's artwork tells the story of how everyone and everything is connected in Aboriginal culture — the land, sea, sky, and animals. The piece also symbolises Aboriginal people coming together as one to celebrate **50 Years of NAIDOC**.

Adding to the celebrations, the Aboriginal Education Team provided daily activities for students, including face painting, sharing NAIDOC themed cake, iced biscuits, colouring in, beading, earring designing, and braiding, ensuring everyone had the chance to be part of the week. It was a truly memorable week of pride, culture, and connection at GSHS. We look forward with excitement and curiosity to see what next year's NAIDOC Week will bring.



This year, our dance group has been given a Wajarri name by the language teacher, Mr Grant Dodd, at Geraldton SHS. We are proud to share that our official name is Wirri Bundara Dance Group, which means "Blackfulla Stars". This name reflects our pride in culture, connection to Country, and the strength and brilliance of our students as they share their stories through dance. This Term, four students attended the Yamatji On Country Youth Workshop with YMAC staff, held at the Geraldton University Centre. This year's workshop focused on one of the key youth priorities: Reconnection to Culture. Students learned about the importance of reconnecting to their culture, and how this connection strengthens their sense of identity, their bond with ancestors, and their relationship with Country. They were also fortunate to hear from inspiring guest speakers who reminded everyone just how powerful and important culture is.

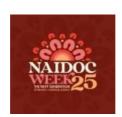

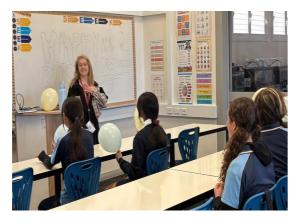




### Year 8

Empathy students can imagine perspectives and experiences of others as if they were their own. Empathy involves imagining what it might be like to 'walk in another's shoes' and identifying with others' feelings, situations and motivations.

### Year 9

Students have been exploring how and why texts are adapted for changing contexts. Shakespeare's *Taming of the Shrew* is compared to the teen film, *Ten Things I Hate About You.* 

### Year 11 General

Critical thinking was essential this Term as students worked through the *Elementary* unit. We explored the justice system using real-life criminal narratives. Students were then challenged to research a 'True Crime' and present the who, what, when, where, how, and why of the crime, whilst also being critical of the evidence and process. It was a rewarding experience discussing different interpretations and opinions of the criminal process and mysteries that it entails.

### Year 12 ATAR

To teach this group of young adults has been a privilege. They have demonstrated growth in their ability to engage with complex and controversial ideas; craft thought provoking texts and critically appraise a wide range of literary and multi-modal texts. We know they leave with skills to think critically, communicate effectively and engage thoughtfully with the world around them.





### **MATHS**

The year is drawing to a close for our Year 12 students. The General Mathematics courses will complete course classes at the end of the term. However, they still have the opportunity to hand in unsubmitted work if they are falling short of a passing grade so long as they submit by the end of Week 1 in Term 4.

ATAR Mathematics courses will finish their classes and sit their exams during the holidays. They then will sit their external WACE exams in Term 4. We wish them the best for their exam preparation, and remind all ATAR Mathematics students that they can still access their maths teachers prior to their WACE exams if they need additional help with their preparation. All ATAR Mathematics students will receive past WACE papers to assist them prepare.

On another note, GSHS students participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition organised by the Australian Maths Trust and delivered onsite to 30 Lower School students. Congratulations to the 70 students who participated. Their commitment and willingness to take on the challenge was noted and was most commendable. Eight students were recognised with a Credit for their performance and 26 with a Proficiency. A great effort.

### **SCIENCE**

### **Year 8 Digestion**

Year 8 students enjoyed learning about digestion in their Science lessons in Term 3. As part of their work on body systems they explored both physical and chemical digestion that takes place in the human body. This was brought to life when they took part in a practical experiment that saw them explore the different stages of digestion from the mouth, down the oesophagus (a funnel and tube) to the stomach (a plastic bag) and onto the small and large intestines (a pair of tights). Lastly, their food was excreted from the rectum through the anus into the waiting 'toilet bowl'. The students added the required stomach acid and various enzymes along the way to speed up the process just as it would inside our bodies. Good fun was had by all and hopefully they will never forget the process of digestion!

### **New APEX Science Room**

The Science APEX classes are thrilled to officially move into the recently refurbished rooms, part of the \$1.5 million STEM build funded by the State Government. These modern learning spaces are designed to inspire curiosity and innovation, providing students with cutting-edge facilities to support their studies. The Year 8 APEX class was fortunate to enjoy a tantalising first glimpse, making the most of the new whiteboard tables for interactive learning and creative problem-solving. Excitement is building as all APEX students prepare to take full advantage of these state-of-the-art classrooms.



### **Year 9 CoRE Science Camp**

The Year 9 CoRE APEX Science class enjoyed their first overnight field trip, filled with hands-on learning and unforgettable experiences. The day began at Cape Burney, where students explored sediment deposition and were fortunate to meet field scientists studying microplastics, who generously shared their research processes. From there, the group travelled to Point Leander to examine the fossilised remains of a tropical coral reef before heading to Mingenew where we set up camp, debriefing the day's discoveries, and braving a chilly evening of stargazing.

Although heavy rains in recent weeks closed access to Coal Seam Conservation Park, the students adapted to the modified plans and completed their studies at Mingenew Hill and Depot Hill Reserve. Here, they investigated ecosystems, observed wildflowers in bloom, explored symbiotic relationships, and traced an extraordinary 20-million-year slice of Earth's history through exposed geology. The trip not only brought science to life but also inspired excitement to start their Project Based Learning, *A Journey Through Time*.





### Year 8 CoRE Field Trip

On Wednesday, 29 August our Year 8 APEX class had the privilege of joining CoRE project leader and Geologist, Ms Suzy Urbaniac on a journey to discover the riches of Western Australia's sand. Students were given an informative talk from Suzy at Back Beach where the formation of the dunes and effect of wave action were explained. The students were shown the hidden minerals in the sand and the next part of the journey began.

Their second stop of the day was at the ILUKA Resources sand refinery site in Narngulu. After a comprehensive health and safety briefing students enjoyed a sausage sizzle in the complex garden. With full stomachs they boarded the bus for a tour of the sand refinery followed by the chance to take a look in the science labs at the site. The technicians explained the analysis they conduct on each batch of sand to ascertain its mineral complex. A fabulous day had by all to kick start their projects.



# Geraldton SHS Year 8 & 9 APEX students visited the Australian Defence Satellite Communications Station

Our Year 8 and 9 APEX students were thrilled to tour the ADSCS in Kojarena, as part of the Department of Defence's Science Outreach program in the lead up to National Science Week, with the 2025 theme "Decoding the Universe – Exploring the unknown with nature's hidden language"—a perfect match for this experience.

Highlights of the visit included:

- Walking inside a pressurised RADOME housing a 26 metre satellite antenna
- Discovering how the Yamatji people once communicated via an indigenous communication stone on site
- Exploring back-up emergency power generators and high-voltage switch rooms
- Seeing the data storage centre and learning about fibre-optic data transmission—complete with a fun computer server reassembly challenge

We hope this inspired our students to one day lead the next generation of Western Australian scientists and innovators.

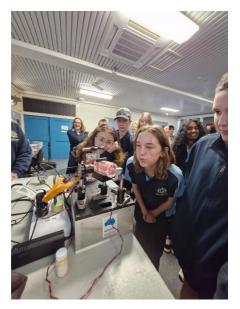


### **Quantum Dark Matter Road Trip**

Geraldton SHS students dove into the mysteries of dark matter and explored quantum technology through hands-on activities and engaging science talks led by a team of passionate scientists from the National Quantum & Dark Matter Road Trip team.

This event was part of a nation-wide science tour, brought to regional schools as part of National Science Week, supported by ARC Centres of Excellence for Engineered Quantum Systems (EQUS) and Dark Matter Particle Physics (CDM) and a few lucky Year 11 and 12 students got to have an interview on GWN7 News.











### **HASS**

Term 3 has been a busy and exciting one in HASS!

We said 'Bon Voyage' to Mrs Claire Annison as she went on Long Service Leave for this Semester and welcomed Mr Kevin Burt, who has joined us all the way from London. Mr Burt and his family are enjoying the Geraldton lifestyle, and he has quickly made a great impression. His lessons have been full of colour and creativity—he even used Skittles to explain the American economy of the 1920s. This hands-on activity helped students understand complex concepts, such as the Stock Market and "borrowing on the margins."

Our students have also been achieving wonderful things. Jessica (Year 9 APEX) wrote an outstanding essay on the Australian economy during World War I. Her work impressed Ms Courtney Evans and Mr Jesse Steele, who both thought a senior student could have written it! Jessica decided to enter her essay into the National History Challenge. She worked hard to learn how to reference like an academic and submitted her final piece just in time for the midnight deadline. We are very proud to share that Jessica achieved a Bronze Certificate, and we look forward to hearing more about her success in the competition.

In Year 10, Ms Kristie Murphy has taken a creative and yummy approach by getting her students into the kitchen! They cooked golden syrup dumplings using a recipe from the 1940s—an engaging way to connect with their studies of Australia between 1919 and 1945.



Our senior students have also been working diligently. The Year 11 Modern History ATAR class has been exploring Germany and the rise of the Nazi Party, while the Year 12's have been studying the Struggle for Peace in the Middle East. A highlight was Mr Steele's visit to the Year 12's, where he shared stories from his travels through the West Bank and Israel. With exams just around the corner, we wish all our senior students the very best as they prepare to showcase their learning.

### **Fashion and Textiles**

Our Year 10 Fashion & Textiles students recently had the exciting opportunity to visit the Geraldton Regional Art Gallery to experience *Stitched and Bound*, a touring exhibition presented by the West Australian Quilters Association (WAQA). This contemporary showcase celebrates the bold and imaginative work of Western Australian artists who are redefining the boundaries of quilt-making as an art form.

Students were captivated by the diverse techniques on display—many of which mirrored what they've been exploring in class. From traditional stitching to experimental use of unconventional materials, the exhibition offered a rich tapestry of inspiration for our current upcycling project. Thought-provoking conversations emerged as we delved into the stories and symbolism woven into each piece.

A huge commendation to our students for their impeccable manners, curiosity, and enthusiasm throughout the visit. You represented our school with pride and passion.

### **Jewellery**

The Year 9's and 10's have been making bracelets and bangles in their introduction to Jewellery. The students are using copper, brass and nickel silver metals in wire and sheet form. They have been using various jewellers pliers to bend wire into figure 8's and jump rings to make the bracelets. To make the bangles they have been using strips of copper, brass or silver sheet metal cut to the length of their wrist size. They have been applying a hammered texture to the metal (planishing), annealing (softening) their work with the jewellers and then forming on the bangle torch, mandrels. They are then learning to silver solder the join, and then file, sand and polish the bangle. The results so far have been very good with a high degree of success.

The Year 11's and 12's have been very busy producing their projects for the Young Jewellers Awards (YJA) sponsored by Latitude Jewellers in Marine Terrace. The Gallery, owned by Ms Pia Boschetti, gives each student an Abrolhos pearl to display on their own personally designed piece of jewellery. The theme this year is "Welcome to the Circus", and it has been wonderful to see an array of ideas from the students. The students have been using their previous knowledge to cast semiprecious metals (copper, brass, nickel silver) and precious metals (sterling silver) into cuttlefish at around 1000 degrees celsius, setting CZ stones into chenier tube or flush setting onto castings, setting pearls onto post and cup or bezel settings. and devising ways of connecting the jewellery to the wearer by ways of loops and bales. The student work will be displayed at Latitude Gallery in late November, and awards given to outstanding work.







### **Home Economics**

We have had a great start to Semester 2 in Home Economics with a new group of Year 7 students coming through for their first time learning Home Economics. As well as a new group of Year 9 students coming through for the Budding Chefs 2 Course. Our senior school classes run year long and sadly, our wonderful Year 12's will be leaving us at the end of this term. But not to worry, they will be moving onto bigger and better things, and you never know... we may have a future Master Chef in our midst.

### Year 7 Intro to Foods

Our Year 7 Intro to Food students have been learning about safety in the kitchen, basic cutting and other food preparation techniques like peeling, grating, dicing and kneading. The students have been using The Australian Guide to Healthy Eating to guide them in making healthy, well-balanced meals and snacks that nourish their growing bodies. Our first cook was a veggie stick creation with French Onion Dip. This was a fun little activity where students got to practice their basic cutting skills while creating something fun out of the veggies. Last week we cooked delicious Choc Chip Cookies and next week students will be making their own healthy snack that they designed themselves. The Year 7 students love being in the kitchen and we love seeing them grow and develop their skills.

### Year 9 Budding Chefs

This Semester in Year 9, we are running the Budding Chefs 2 program which is quite different from the Budding Chefs program run in Semester 1. This program has four main topics that students learn about then cook dishes based around what they have learnt. The four topics are:

- The Meat Industry & Production
- Vegetables & Plant Based Proteins
- Grains, Seeds and Pulses
- Festive Foods

All four topics have a strong focus on sustainability and allow students to see where the food we eat comes from, how it is produced and what impacts the production of these foods has on the environment and the economy. Each topic gives students an opportunity to expand their knowledge about food safety, preparation, availability of produce as well as the physical and sensory properties of different foods. An example of this is when students were learning about plant-based meats and how minced meat is easier to replicate than whole cuts of meat because of the texture and structure of the muscle fibres. The Year 9's have thoroughly enjoyed the meat topic, however, are not as enthusiastic about the vegetables. I would love to see our budding chefs students practicing getting creative with vegetables and cooking some delicious vegetable dishes at home. Veggies are great!!!



#### Year 12 Food Science

What an amazing group of Year 12 students we have had this year. It has been a privilege to teach these students valuable life skills that they will take with them when they leave school as young adults. This year the students have studied the functional properties of food where they have learnt about things like crystallisation in foods, leavening, caramelisation, emulsification and gelatinisation. During this process we made some yummy dishes to represent this including caramelised onions for steak sandwiches, our own garlic aioli, fettucine carbonara, butter chicken and cinnamon scrolls. Our Year 12's also learnt the art of preserving foods and got to make some delicious preserves that got sent home in a gift basket. These included lemon cordial, pickled beetroot, pickled red onions, strawberry jam and lemon butter. The students did very well with this task and their sterilisation of the jars was brilliant. Everyone's produce survived and tasted delicious.

It will be sad to see our Year 12's go, but they have worked so hard and have learnt so much. Best of luck in all your endeavours Year 12's. Keep on cooking!











## LEARNING AREAS

#### Metalwork

#### Year 10 Metalwork

The Year 10 Metalwork students have been busy manufacturing folding shovels and junior hacksaws. Throughout the project, they have developed their welding skills using oxy-acetylene and have also used lathes to manufacture custom nuts and bolts. In addition, they have learned how to accurately shape metal using a Magna Bend and gained experience in marking out materials precisely with a range of metalworking tools.

#### Year 11 Metalwork

The Year 11 Metalwork students have been fabricating adjustable stools and occasional tables using various types of mild steel. Their projects have involved machining precise components on the lathe, shaping metal with the aid of heat and jigs, and joining parts using MIG welding techniques. Students have also created their own unique designs in AutoCAD and personalised their finished pieces using the CNC laser cutter.



# Year 12 Students Get Hands-On with Go-Kart Mechanics

This Term, Year 12 students at Geraldton SHS have been exploring the fundamentals of vehicle systems—through the exciting and hands-on world of go-kart mechanics.

As part of their automotive studies, students are gaining practical experience by working on go-karts. This small-scale approach allows them to strip down engines, service key components, and adjust brakes and suspension systems until everything runs smoothly. It's a dynamic way to understand how vehicle systems function in real-world settings.

In our dedicated workshop space, students carefully service go-kart engines using professional tools and techniques. With parts laid out across the bench and wrenches in hand, they're learning to troubleshoot, repair, and rebuild—skills that are not only essential in the automotive industry but also foster critical thinking and problem-solving.

This hands-on learning brings classroom theory to life and gives students a deeper appreciation of mechanical systems. It's a great example of how applied learning can spark curiosity, build confidence, and prepare students for future pathways.

We're proud of the enthusiasm and focus our students bring to this project and look forward to seeing their skills continue to grow.





# ACADEMIC PROGRAM OF EXCELLENCE (APEX)

#### **Year 9 Mingenew Camp**

Our Year 9 APEX students will head out on an overnight camp to Mingenew. The two-day trip provides an exciting opportunity for hands-on fieldwork, stargazing, and exploration of geological formations and wildflower displays. The camp directly supports students' CoRE project work, linking classroom learning with real-world investigations.

#### Year 8 APEX Field Trip

Year 8 students will take part in a local field trip exploring Back Beach, where they will conduct field sketches, collect environmental data, and study erosion. They will also tour the Narngulu Iluka Mineral Separation Plant to learn about mineral sands, industry processes, and the economic impact on our region. This experience forms the foundation of a fourtneen-week investigation into mineral sands, culminating in student-led presentations.

#### **APEX Spy Base Excursion**

As part of Science Week, both Year 8 and 9 APEX students visited the Australian Defence Satellite Communications Station. Students took part in an outreach program delivered by Defence staff, enjoyed a sausage sizzle lunch, and explored the cutting-edge science behind Australia's satellite communications.

#### **Celebrating Our Mathletes!**

A huge congratulations to our 70 amazing APEX students who recently took part in the Australian Mathematics Competition! Your hard work, problem-solving skills, and persistence were truly inspiring.

We're so proud of the effort you all put in and can't wait to see your results when they arrive. No matter the outcome, participating in this challenge is an achievement in itself — well done, team!

#### **APEX Students Shine in Tournament of Minds**

5 teams of enthusiastic Year 8 and 9 APEX students proudly represented our school in this year's Tournament of Minds (TOM), hosted here at Geraldton SHS. A huge well done to all teams — The Boys, The Easily Distracted, The Indi's Band, The Quiet Girls and The Quirky Girls — for their hard work, enthusiasm and innovative thinking.

Tournament of Minds is a highly regarded problemsolving competition that challenges students to demonstrate creativity, teamwork, and critical thinking. Working in self-formed teams, our students volunteered to take part and dedicated their own time after school and during breaks to prepare for the event.

Each team worked collaboratively on long-term challenges across disciplines such as STEM, The Arts, Social Sciences, and Language Literature. They developed innovative solutions, practised presentations, and supported one another through the process. On competition day, they not only presented their prepared solutions to a panel of judges but also tackled the spontaneous challenge—requiring them to think on their feet and work together under pressure.

## **CAREER TASTER PROGRAM**

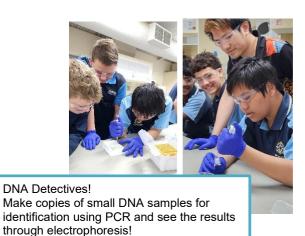

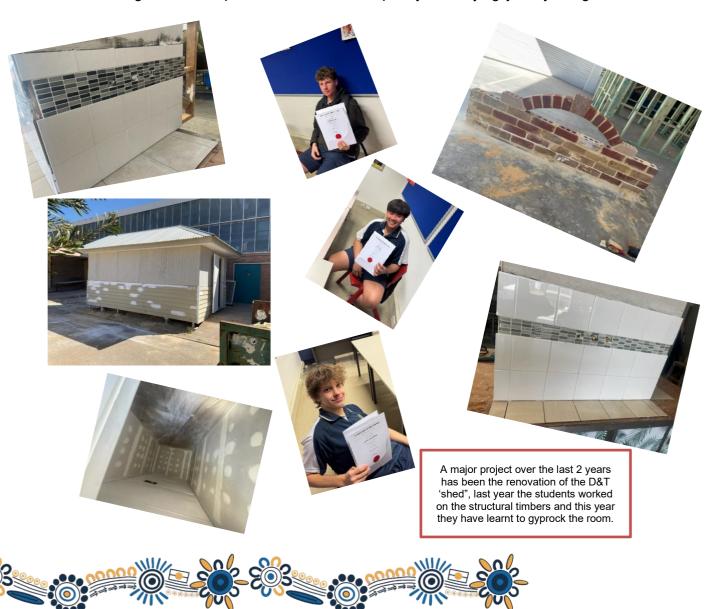
# SKILLING THROUGH ENTERPRISE PROGRAM (STEP)

The STEP Program allows Year 11 students to explore future career pathways in their work placement each Wednesday as well as gaining vocational skills in a VET Certificate. Two certificates are offered through the program – Certificate II in Construction Pathways delivered by Construction-On-Site at the TRADE Training Centre and Certificate II in Rural Operations at Central Regional TAFE. STEP is a valuable stepping stone to full time employment including apprenticeships or to look at further study at TAFE. Those that continue schooling into Year 12 often apply to the pre-apprenticeship programs.

In this article we feature the Certificate II Construction Pathways. This has given students entry level construction skills including:

- Measurements and calculations
- Workplace Health and Safety (WHS)
- Reading plans and specifications
- Effective communication on-site

The certificate has given them exposure to trades like: carpentry, bricklaying, joinery and general construction.



## **FOLLOW THE DREAM**

Term 3 has been a busy term for Follow the Dream (FTD) students with Year 10, 11 and 12 students attending the Culture, Careers, and Leadership Camp in Perth. Students also participated in an incursion with Australian Defence Force (ADF) and were extremely privileged to be part of the audience as they were hosted by the very talented and entertaining Mr Sean Choolburra. But the incursions didn't stop there, former Fremantle Dockers legend, Mr Roger Hayden also came to our school to run a Leadership Coaching session with our senior students.

In addition to incursions and camps, FTD before and after school tutoring sessions have improved dramatically with the increase in student engagement and participation in the program.

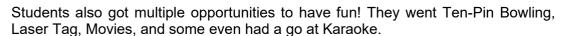
At the beginning of Term 3, FTD started morning and afternoon tutoring sessions in the Clontarf Academy, in addition to the tutoring sessions already taking place in the Language and Cultural Centre. Students now have the privilege of accessing tutoring from multiple classrooms in the school, with dedicated tutors delivering tutoring across all learning areas.

#### Culture, Careers, Leadership Camp

Upon arrival in Perth, students were welcomed to Noongar Country by Mr Jonathon Garlett, where they participated in a traditional smoking ceremony, and didgeridoo performance.

Designed to motivate students to aspire with a clear purpose in an environment that fosters a sense of belonging, students also participated in the Polly Farmer Foundation Careers Expo and the Kedala Djinanginy Curtin Day to discover career, education, and training prospects.

But the highlight of the tour was the participation in the Mission to Mars at the Western Australian Space Science Education Centre (WASSEC). The mission required students to work in teams to use their problem-solving skills to successfully complete a geological survey of the Mars surface! Students played the role of an astronaut and entered the Mars surface to execute their research assignments. Then as mission controllers, students guided the astronauts to effectively execute their research assignments.









#### **Australian Defence Force**

Bonnie and Josh, from the Royal Australian Navy, Specialist Indigenous Recruitment Team, spoke to Follow the Dream students about different opportunities available for those interested in joining the Navy, Army or Air Force.

They went on to explain the Navy Indigenous Development Program, as well as the Army Indigenous Development Program, and what choices, benefits and entitlements are available, should students consider a career in the Australian Defence Force.



#### Sean Choolburra

A highly renowned, pioneering Indigenous comedian, dancer, storyteller, and cultural ambassador, Mr Sean Choolburra is one of Australia's most prominent Indigenous entertainers. Upon his visit to our school, he seamlessly blended traditional Aboriginal culture with contemporary comedy and performance, whilst practicing the cultural traditions of his elders. Our students were in awe of his performance, and happily joined in with the singing, performing and entertaining.



#### Roger Hayden



After a career spanning more than 120 games with the Fremantle Dockers, Mr Roger Hayden now plays a vital role in developing the stars of the future. As the Next Generation Coach, and the Indigenous and Multicultural Liaison Officer at the club, Roger visited Geraldton SHS to inspire students to be the best they can be through educational pathways on offer to them. Roger spoke about the importance of attending school, completing studies and accessing the support services around them. He then spoke about his post-AFL journey, and the importance of being aspirational and having a back-up plan in place should your journey or path change.



# PATHWAY TO EMPLOYMENT (P2E) 2025

This Term, a select group of Lighthouse students embarked on a 9-week *Pathway to Employment* (P2E) program, proudly run by the City of Greater Geraldton. Now in its 5th year, this highly successful initiative continues to provide invaluable opportunities for students with special needs. The program is designed not only to showcase the many services and industries available across Geraldton but also to give students real-world, hands-on experience in these settings.

Throughout the course of the program, students participate in visits to local facilities including the Geraldton Library, Art Gallery, TAFE campus, Tech Park, Queens Park Theatre, Aquarena, and even take part in bike-riding workshops.
